I am so excited to feature our fellow Newtonian Jamie Grossman and her family this month. It could be likely that you already know her, as her career and longstanding involvement in local non-profit organizations give her quite a bit of local exposure.

Jamie is a licensed Realtor with Gibson Sotheby's International Realty. She has a reputation for providing the finest luxury service to her clients, whether they are selling their home, purchasing a new one, or hunting for an investment property.

For Jamie, real estate has always been a joy and a concentration. "I study home design, space, and renovations to improve and bring homes and properties back to life," says Jamie. "JF&CS has long been my passion, but I also served as community volunteer for Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, the Rashi School when my daughters attended the school, Silent Springs Institute, Dana-Farber Women's Executive Council and I rode in the Pan-Mass Challenge for many years."

During her tenure at JF&CS, she founded Shoulder to Shoulder, a military family support program now called HomeFront Strong and housed with the Brookfield Institute. HomeFront Strong is a community peer support program that



networks military connected volunteers to service members, veterans, and their families.

It's no surprise that this generous mom raised three amazing daughters, and now happily includes two fantastic sons-inlaw. The girls all share their mom's passion for volunteerism. The Grossman family legacy of love and volunteering is generational, as Jamie's mom, Joan Adess Grossman, was president of Jewish Family & Children's Service in their native Philadelphia.

The apples certainly did not fall far from the tree in many respects. All three of her daughters, Jessica, Dana and Lauren, are intelligent, incredibly talented, and productive members of the local community. Jessica is a Family Therapist. Her new husband, Brandon Fisher, is with Thermo Fisher Scientific. Dana teaches kindergarten at Stratton Elementary School in Arlington, MA and her husband Michael Kollaard works with Decibel at Medallia. Lauren teaches second grade at the Bridge Charter School in Roxbury, MA and is pursuing a Master's Degree from Boston College.

Jamie surrounds herself with unique and talented people. Her life partner, Bob Kinder, had a long and distinguished career in the military prior to meeting Jamie. Bob spent 24 years in the military and was a Special Forces Army Ranger with several tours in the Middle East and Panama.



# LOVE, FAMILY-STYLE

The sort of love that I'm most in touch with these days is love of family. It began in the dawn of my consciousness before I was even verbal. It is "prehistorically old" in terms of my selfhood. It gives me identity and a place where I belong irrefutably. It gave me my name. All my earliest experiences took place within it. I certainly haven't outgrown it and I never will. It gives me a core and a skin, it has to do with my internal essence and the lens through which I perceive and process the world.

I'm sure it has come into focus because of my mother's death a few years ago. (My father died 40 years earlier.) It was a timely death as she was 97 ½. Her passing was a big deal for me. I had become something of a spiritual caretaker for her; I took on the role of encouraging and providing her with recreational and social activities to the extent that this was possible given her declining health and advancing dementia. She had been a major influence on me and was always a big part of my life, for better or worse.

After her death, my two sisters and I, who were close in age but in no other way, were obliged to work together to settle her affairs, deal with lawyers and so forth, from the most gutwrenching decision of when to terminate her life support to



the mundane but equally emotional task of dividing furniture, photographs, dishes and what-have-you, which all had to be moved from the family home where we grew up and where she lived for 60 years.

During this time, which stretched into two years, we had to collaborate and tolerate each other's unique temperaments, priorities, and schedules, which were often in conflict. It was stressful and trying. I remember that one day at my banking job we had to complete a questionnaire devised by a consulting company for the bank to assess itself in terms of employee satisfaction. One question stands out in my mind: it was "Do your co-workers feel like family?" My first thought was "No, thank God!" I didn't particularly like my teammates but being at work provided a respite from the drama, strife and upheaval going on in my personal life.

Thankfully, that phase is over (as is the job), and I'm now closer and on better terms with both sisters than I ever have been as an adult. We came through the crucible and are left with a rare appreciation of each other that we probably never felt before and, if we did, certainly saw no need to express. I have worked hard to make this sparse tribe work for myself. It's just us now, and they are both precious to me.

Family has been a refuge for me, although in my youth it was also a trial. As the youngest, I was often short-changed of attention, overshadowed, and dominated by my older sisters. But the "ugly stepsisters" who blighted my childhood have for the moment receded like ghosts into the mist of the past.

I am a shy person and not trusting of others. Family love comes without the conscious investment involved in growing beyond the family, in putting yourself out there and widening your circle, and the risk of indifference or rejection. It is one of my goals to be able to push myself outward toward the world and to give myself the opportunity to take in love from other sources. I also hope to spend more time on activities that bring me joy and connection, whether solitary or in tandem, because this is one of the best ways, I know to nurture self-love.

#### Newton Free Library Presents: Racism Not Race with Joseph L. Graces and Alan H. Goodman Wirtual

Authors Joseph L. Graves Jr. and Alan H. Goodman will discuss their book Racism. Not Race: Answers to Frequently Asked Questions. The science on race is clear. Common categories like "Black," "White," and "Asian" do not represent genetic differences among groups. But if race is a pernicious fiction according to natural science, it is all too significant in the day-to-day lives of racialized people across the globe. Drawing on evidence from both natural and social science, Graves and Goodman dismantle the myth of gene-based racial difference and demonstrate that the ideology of racism created races. Racism, Not Race shows readers why antiracist principles are both just and backed by sound science.

Joseph L. Graves Jr. is a professor in the Department of Biology at North Carolina A&T State University. He is a fellow of the Council of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. His books include The Emperor's New Clothes: Biological Theories of Race at the Millennium (2001) and The Race Myth: Why We Pretend Race Exists in America (2005). Alan H. Goodman is a professor of biological anthropology at Hampshire College and a former vice president for academic affairs. He is a past president of the American Anthropological Association and codirects its public education project on race. He is a coauthor of Race: Are We So Different? 


